DR. JOHN E. CARNE DIES LAST NIGHT OF HEART ATTACK

Had Been Practising Physician In Dyersburg For Last Decade

Dr. John Emmerson Carne, prominent Dyersburg physician and highly esteemed resident, died unexpectedly about 10:30 o'clock last night of a heart attack. He was forty-two. Stricken while making the

of six house calls, which he began after closing his offices for the day early last night, Dr. Carne expired at the home of a patient before medical assistance could be rendered.

He had been a practicing physician in Dyersburg since 1948, with the exception of two years spent in the Army during the Korean war, with one year in Germany. He held the rank of Captain. He also was in service during World War II. Gibson Countian

Carne was the son of the late thur N. Carne and Mrs. Carrie Hutchison Carne, both members of outstanding pioneer Gibson county families. He was born at Dyer. Following his graduation from Lambuth College at Jackson, Dr.

Carne entered the educational field and became superintendent of the consolidated Spring Hill school in Gibson county. He was graduated from the Uni-versity of Tennessee Medical Col-

lege in Memphis as a member of the 1947 class, and served his internship at the John Gaston Hospital in Memphis. Wide Practice He had a wide practice in Dyer county, answering the summons of

was devoted. He was a member of the Americon Medical Society, the Tennessee State Medical Society and at the time of his death was secretary-

treasurer of the Dyer, Lake and Crockett County Medical Society. He was a membeer of the Phi Chi medical fraternity. He was active also in civic af-fairs. He was a member of the Methodist church, of Dyersburg Post No. 30 of the American Legion, and a member of the Kiwanis
