Services Held Here For Widely Known Practising Dyersburg Physician

Funeral services were held today at two o'clock for Dr. John E. Carne, Dyersburg physician who died of a heart attack on Tuesday night while making a house call at the residence of a patient.

Rites were said at the First Methodist Church here by the Reverend A. L. Dickerson, pastor, assisted by the Reverend H. J. Burkett, superintendent of the Dyersburg District Methodist Church.

Following the services a funeral cortege departed for Dyer, where burial was in the family plot in the Dyer City Cemetery. Curry's had charge of arrangements.

Dr. Carne was a graduate of Lambuth College at Jackson and served as superintendent of the consolidated Spring Hill school before entering the University of Tennessee Medical College in Memphis. He graduated in the class of 1947, interned at John Gaston Hospital there and began the practice of medicine here in 1948.

Dr. Carne served in World War II and was captain in the Army Medical Corps in Europe during the Korean War.

He was a member of the American Medical Society, the Tennessee State Medical Society, and at the time of his death was secretary-treasurer of the Dyer-Lake-Obion County Medical Society.

Active in church and civic affairs in Dyersburg he belonged to the Methodist Church here and was a member of Post 30 American Legion and the Kiwanis Club.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ruth Jones Carne; two children, David Carne and Nancy Carne; a sister, Mrs. Marguerite Harrison of Dyer, and a brother, Hugh Nathaniel Carne of Dyer.
